
## STICKY WILD BUCKWHEAT



Polygonaceae (Knotweed/Buckwheat Family)


Phenology: flowering April-May.

**Management Responsibility:** BLM (AZ Strip Field Office), NPS (Lake Mead NRA).


**Similar Species:** no other annual buckwheat in the area has highly glandular and threadlike stems and yellow flowers. *E. viscidulum* is similar to *E. subreniforme* of southern Utah, northern Arizona, and northwestern New Mexico. The latter species has white flowers and stems are not threadlike.

**Notes:** sand adheres to the glandular stems and inflorescences. Often seen with *Astragalus geyeri* var. *triquetrus*.

Habitat: low dunes, washes and areas of aeolian accumulation, in loose sandy soils, within Mohave desertscrub, 1,500-2,500 ft (450-765 m) elevation.



**Range:** extreme northwestern Arizona; also found in Lincoln and Clark counties, Nevada.
