
Navajo Phlox Phlox Phlox cluteana



Phenology: flowering and fruiting June to July.

Management Responsibility: Navajo Nation, BLM (AZ Strip Field Office).

Similar Species: *Phlox amabilis* and *P. longifolia* have taproots and usually deciduous leaves, whereas *P. cluteana* has a slender rootstock and evergreen leaves.

Notes: Phlox cluteana is locally abundant.

Habitat: light to heavy shade under ponderosa pine, Gambel oak, or pinyon and juniper in sandy soils with leaf litter, 6,000-10,400 ft (1830-3170 m) elevation.

Range: northern Chuska Mountains, Navajo Mountain, and Black Rock Mountains; also in adjacent New Mexico and Utah.
